

Juliette Low



Objectives:

This patch program is designed to help girls learn more about Juliette Gordon Low, the founder of Girl Scouting.

Grade Level Requirements:

To earn this patch, everyone must complete requirements 1, 2 and 3. These requirements can be done as a troop or individually. Each grade level must also complete the minimum number of activities listed below:

Requirements:

1. Read about Juliette Low in your Girl Scout handbook or another book. When and where was she born? What was her full name? Who were her parents and siblings? What was her nickname?
2. Juliette Low married William Low in 1886. They both enjoyed adventures. Find out what tragic event happened during their wedding? Where did they move to after the wedding? When and where did she live in America? You may also find out more about other countries she traveled to.
3. On March 12, 1912, Juliette Low started the first scouting program for girls. This organization was very important to her. What did she sell to keep the program running? What would you give up for a cause you cared about? Do you know of any other examples of people making great sacrifices?
4. As a child, Juliette Low enjoyed using her imagination to create games. Some common games of Daisy's time period were: blind man's bluff, tag, bubble-blowing, biographical nonsense (madlibs), nine-men's morris, tic-tac-toe and solitaire. Play a game from this time period.
5. When Juliette Low (Daisy) was a child, what types of toys did she play with? Home-made toys were common and children today still play with many of them. Play with some toys that Daisy might have had: jump rope, graces, hoop and stick, marbles, tops, yo-yos, jack straws (pick-up sticks), cat's cradle or jacks.
6. Did you know that Daisy created a children's magazine in which everything, including all the articles and illustrations, were completed by children? Create a collage of the things she enjoyed or create a timeline of her life.
7. Daisy enjoyed painting, sculpting, drawing and designing. Some of her artwork is displayed at her birthplace in Savannah, Georgia. Create one of the following art projects: watercolors, clay sculptures, design a room or draw portraits. The choice is yours; art is an expression of the creator's feelings or enjoyments.
8. Learn the following: Girl Scout motto, Girl Scout slogan, handshake and the quiet sign.
9. Learn about Juliette's birthplace, Savannah, Georgia. Find Savannah on a map or globe. How far is it from where you are? Learn about her home and about the First Headquarters.
10. Write a poem or compose a song about Juliette. Read your poem or sing your song to younger Girl Scouts.
11. Juliette attended a finishing school. In which state and city was it located? What's the name of the finishing school? Learn about some of the lessons Juliette would have received at finishing school: the language of the fan, place setting (setting the table) and how to curtsy.
12. Juliette had a Liberty ship named after her in World War II. What are Liberty ships? When was it christened?
13. Learn about a Scout's Own Ceremony. At your next event, hold a Scout's Own Ceremony.
14. Make homemade paper dolls like Juliette did with a friend and exchange them with one another.
15. Juliette loved drama. Her favorite pastime was writing and starring in plays or skits. Learn about the following terms: pantomime, monologue, costumes and props. Create a skit and act it out.
16. Learn about the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund.
17. Participate in a Thinking Day event.
18. Learn about Girl Guides from around the world. What are their activities? Do you need to be in the same country to do the some of the activities?
19. Learn about the first Girl Scout troop and uniforms. Where was the first troop formed and how many participants were there? What did the first uniform look like?

20. Juliette passed away due to breast cancer. What can you do as a troop to promote breast health awareness?
21. What is a Girl Scout SWAP? Learn the history of Girl Scout SWAPs. Have you ever received a SWAP? If so, share with your troop. Have you and your troop ever made SWAPs? What were they? Who did you SWAP with? Make SWAPs for an upcoming event with Girl Scouts.
22. Learn about the first cookies and how they were sold. Are the cookies this year the same as last year? What is your favorite cookie? How many cookies did you sell last year? What is your cookie goal for this year (personal/troop goal)? What do you plan to do with your cookie profits?
23. Juliette learned sign language. Why? Learn the Girl Scout Promise in sign language. Sing a song while signing. What steps would you and your troop take to include someone who was deaf?
