GIRL SCOUT WEEK: MARCH 7-13

The journey of Girl Scouts has brought us to this 98th year and we're looking GREAT! The Girl Scout Birthday, March 12, commemorates the day in 1912 when Juliette Gordon Low officially registered the organization's first 18 girl members in Savannah, Georgia. Girl Scout Week is celebrated each March, starting with Girl Scout Sunday and ending with Girl Scout Sabbath on a Saturday, and it always includes the Girl Scout Birthday, March 12.

Girl Scout Sunday and Girl Scout Sabbath gives girls an opportunity to attend their place of worship and be recognized as a Girl Scout. If a place of worship is the group sponsor, girls may perform a service, such as greeting, ushering or doing a flag ceremony. These days can also be a time when girls explore other faiths.

Let's Celebrate!

We are celebrating this year with our NEW Council's own Web Programs (CWP). What is CWP? It's programs or information on our Council's Web site that can be downloaded for use with service unit programs and troop/group programs. They will be available in March.

GIRL SCOUT HISTORY

January 1913 – Elizabeth Purse earns the first proficiency badge, Child Nurse. Badges are embroidered by hand by Girl Scout officials until manufactured badges can be produced.

February 1914 – The trefoil design for the membership badge (pin) is patented.

March 9, 1912 – Juliette Gordon Low makes a historic phone call to her cousin, Nina Pape: "Come right over! I've got something for the girls of Savannah, and all America, and all the world, and we're going to start it tonight."

April 1922 – Field News, a monthly bulletin for Girl Scout leaders, begins publication as a supplement to *The American Girl*.

May 12, 1944 – The Liberty Ship *S.S. Juliette Low* is launched in Savannah, Georgia, after being christened by Daisy Gordon Lawrence, a niece of the founder and the first registered Girl Scout in the U.S.

June 1938 – Girl Scout membership passes the half-million mark.

July 23-28, 1920 – The first International Conference of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts is held in Oxford, England.

August 6-20, 1932 – The first Juliette Low Session held at Our Chalet is attended by girls from seven countries, including the United States.

September 1943 – The first official Girl Scout calendar, dated 1944, is produced by the national organization for council and troop fundraising in place of cookies, which most bakers were unable to supply due to war-time rationing of ingredients.

October 1919 – The first nationwide celebrations of Girl Scout Week takes place. It includes October 31, Juliette Low's birthday.

November 1947 – The name of the national organization is changed from Girl Scouts to Girl Scouts of the U.S.A.

December 1983 – President Ronald Reagan signs into law a bill naming a new federal office complex in Savannah for Juliette Low. It is the second federal building in history to be named for a woman.

TAKE ACTION PLANNING

As your troop journeys through *It's Your World – Change It or It's Your Planet – Love It*, they will become excited and motivated about making a difference. They must also complete a Take Action project to earn the Journey awards. So how does a Take Action project differ from a community service project? Take Action encourages girls to think bigger and to solve problems in a meaningful way that is sustainable. Why is this important for our girls?

- ▶ It helps girls identify community needs.
- ▶ Girls develop creative ways to solve problems.
- ▶ Girls become advocates for themselves and others, locally and globally.
- ▶ Girls educate others about the problems they are solving and inspire them to act.
- ▶ Girls feel empowered to make a difference in the world.

Later this spring we will offer a new girl and adult learning opportunity to give you tools to help the girls Take Action! Look for the new course in *Weekly Program Updates*.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT PIN

Have you completed the training required for all troop leaders, assistant troop leaders and co-leaders? Does your troop have a certified CPR/First Aider and trained Troop Camper? Have you applied for the Leadership Development Pin?

This award recognizes registered Girl Scout volunteers who have completed one successful year in the position of troop leader, assistant troop leader or group coordinator; completed required training for the position; has demonstrated competency in the position; and actively recognizes, understands and practices the values of inclusive behavior. To receive this recognition you must complete the

Leadership Development application and submit it to your service unit manager or Community Development Manager who may recommend you for the award. The application for this recognition is on the Council Web site.

PRESIDENT'S AWARD

Is your service unit interested in earning the President's Award? This prestigious award recognizes the efforts of service units who move their assigned areas or audiences toward the Council's goals and objectives. Criteria are established to determine outstanding achievement by service units, and include membership recruitment and retention, leadership training, community cultivation, communication with troop leadership and girls, and fund development. SPOTLIGHT: CAMP COLEMAN

Celebrating 85 Years of Quality Summer Camp Programs

Lying peacefully along the shaded banks of the Cahaba River, Camp Coleman features 140 acres of pristine woods, meadows, creeks and trails. Established in 1925, the camp celebrates its 85th birthday this year. Camp Coleman is conveniently located just off Interstates 59 and 459, near Trussville, Alabama, and is accredited by the American Camp Association (ACA). There's a historical swinging bridge, a crystal-clear swimming pool, a state-of-the-art low and high ropes course, lots of traditional camp activities, and plenty of room to explore. In addition, Camp Coleman has a fantastic Certified Horsemanship Association (CHA) accredited equestrian center with stables, arenas, riding trails and plenty of well-trained horses. The campsite also includes a spacious dining hall and large open-air gym for activities and rainy day events.

Meet the Camp Director

Laura Elliott has been Camp Coleman's director since 1988. Laura began her career in camping at Camp Coleman when she was in college. She holds current American Red Cross First Aid, CPR for the Professional Rescuer, Lifeguard, Basic Water Rescue and Small Craft Safety certifications. She is a Lead Facilitator for low and high ropes, having completed over 250 hours of training. Laura holds Certified Horsemanship Association (CHA) Instructor Certification at Level 4 in both English and Western.

Laura has been a member of the American Camp Association (ACA) for 22 years and serves as an ACA Standards Accreditation Visitor, as a member of ACA Heart of the South Standards Committee, as the Complaint Resolutions Chair and as an ACA National Standards Instructor. What's New for Summer Camp at Camp Coleman?

The planned summer camp programs at Camp Coleman are designed to offer something for everyone with content and descriptions that are sure to appeal to girls with a wide variety of interests. Camp sessions can generally be divided into three broad categories based on the wording of the description and the content of the session: Traditional Sampler, Traditional Specialty and Non-Traditional sessions.

Traditional Sampler programs account for about 57.1% of Camp Coleman's summer camp capacity. Traditional Sampler programs include long-time favorites like Sample & Swim; Sample, Saddle & Swim; Midnight Madness; and, new this year, YouDecide.com, where campers select the activities they want included in

the session content through online voting. Other Traditional Sampler programs at Camp Coleman include: Counselor In Training, Mom & Me, Father/Daughter, Troop Overnight Adventure, Troop Two-Night Adventure and Regular Day Camp.

Traditional Specialty sessions account for 34.3% of Camp Coleman's available summer camp capacity and include resident camp sessions like horse camps, dog camp, arts and crafts camp, CSI camp, hard-core outdoor camps, fashion and design camps. New this year, Trading Places, allows campers to exchange roles with key camp staff to make the day-to-day decisions that keep Camp Coleman running. Also new this year, Camp Rocks, is a talent/performance camp. Other Traditional Specialty programs at Camp Coleman include: Glitz, Glam & Glitter (fashion/design); Legend of the Lost Treasure (adventure quest); CSI Camp; Wrangler In Training; Horse Day Camp; Dog Camp and Horse Whisperer.

Non-Traditional camps make up 8.6% of Camp Coleman's available summer camp capacity. These sessions offer an alternative camp experience for girls who may not be interested in primitive/rustic themes of traditional camp sessions. Using a teen/tween culture description entices girls who might otherwise be reluctant to come to camp. These sessions allow them to experience camp on their own terms. While they're at it, they are also exposed to and allowed to try traditional camp activities. While these sessions may not be everyone's cup of tea, it is important to offer something for everyone.

GSNCA AND ALABAMA CARES/GRANDPARENTS PROGRAM (TARCOG) SUMMER CAMP SCHOLARSHIPS

The **Grandparents Program** with **Alabama Cares** will provide summer camp scholarships for 10 grandchildren to go to Girl Scout camp.

The eligibility requirements are:

- ▶ Grandparent must be 55 years old or older.
- ▶ Grandparent must be the primary caregiver for the child (child must live with grandparent).
- ▶ Grandparent must live in Madison, Marshall, Limestone, Jackson or DeKalb Counties.
- ▶ Grandparent must meet with an Alabama Cares consultant to complete required paperwork.
- ▶ The nominees must have been registered and active in Girl Scouting at least one year prior to the nomination.

Deadline: April 20, 2010

Award: One-week resident camp scholarship is awarded to each recipient.

NEW COUNCIL'S OWN STAGE PERFORMANCE TRY-IT

Girl Scout Troop 28 from Huntsville has created the first Council's Own Try-It. All the girls in the troop attend the same school, The Academy for Academics and Arts (AAA), a Huntsville city arts magnet school (K-8). When they were involved in the production of a huge Christmas musical, they chose to suspend their Brownie activities due to the amount of time and energy that would be devoted to the musical. The girls looked for a Girl Scout Try-It or badge that they could work on as part of the process and could not find anything. That's when the troop decided to develop their own Try-It, so it might be available to others who might be involved in some sort of stage performance, such as a play, recital or concert.
